Area Narrative

Community: South Sanpete

South Sanpete is identified as a G and a high Priority. This coalition is all of the towns in Sanpete County that feed into Manti High School. These communities are Ephraim, Manti, and Sterling. Central Utah Counseling Center and the Coalition have completed the Community Assessment and identified the following risk and protective factors to be addressed: Low

neighborhood attachment, family management, low commitment to the school. The coalition also identified rewards for prosocial behavior as a protective factor to increase.

Central Utah Counseling Center will work with the Sanpete Cares Coalition to increase readiness by working with key leaders to raise awareness of prevention efforts and increase reach to more areas in the community. This effort will increase awareness of programs in the area and the importance of prevention efforts in the south Sanpete Area. Central Utah Counseling will continue to offer evidence-based programs to the community taught to fidelity. The Sanpete Cares Coalition has collaborated with the South Sanpete School District to provide evidence-based programming on school grounds. This collaboration also helps the Sanpete Cares Coalition increase the school district's capacity by providing training on evidence-based prevention practices and policy. Central Utah Counseling will continue to work with local authorities to increase EASY compliance checks. Central Utah Counseling will continue to increase capacity by training members of the Sanpete Cares Coalition in prevention science and cultural competency. The Counseling Center will also evaluate programming to ensure that programs are taught to fidelity and ensure that programming effectively reduces the risk factors and increases protective factors.

By adhering to these guidelines, Central Utah Counseling expects to see a reduction in the risks previously identified and an increase in rewards for prosocial involvement among youth. Central Utah Counseling also expects to see a decrease in lifetime alcohol use among adolescents, e-cigarette use among youth, and opioid overdose deaths.

Community: North Sanpete

North Sanpete is identified as a E-7 and a medium priority. This coalition is all of the towns in Sanpete County that feed into North Sanpete High School. These communities are Mt Pleasant, Moroni, Wales, Spring City, Fairview, Chester, Milburn, and Indianola. Central Utah Counseling Center and the Coalition have completed the Community Assessment and identified the following risk and protective factors to be addressed: Low neighborhood attachment, family conflict, and low commitment to the school. The coalition also identified rewards for prosocial behavior as a protective factor to increase. The coalition has completed the area plan. North Sanpete Cares Coalition is working to improve readiness by working with local cities to advance prevention. This area is a challenge as the towns are spread out, and there is no central meeting place. Central Utah has chosen to focus programming and prevention efforts in the Mt pleasant and Moroni area around the Middle and High schools. The coalition is working to increase capacity and bring services to the Fairview Indianola and Fountain Green areas. Travel to current programming and events can take up to an hour in drive time.

Central Utah Counseling Center will work with the North Sanpete Cares Coalition to increase readiness by working with key leaders to raise awareness of prevention efforts and increase reach to more areas in the community. This effort will increase awareness of programs in the area and the importance of prevention efforts in the North Sanpete Area. Central Utah Counseling will continue to offer evidence-based programs to the community taught to fidelity. The North Sanpete Cares Coalition has collaborated with the North Sanpete School District to provide evidence-based programming on school grounds. This collaboration also helps the North Sanpete Cares Coalition increase the school district's capacity by providing training on

evidence-based prevention practices and policy. Central Utah Counseling will continue to work with local authorities to increase EASY compliance checks. Central Utah Counseling will continue to increase capacity by training members of the North Sanpete Cares Coalition in prevention science and cultural competency. The Counseling Center will also evaluate programming to ensure that programs are taught to fidelity and ensure that programming effectively reduces the risk factors and increases protective factors.

By adhering to these guidelines, Central Utah Counseling expects to see a reduction in the risks previously identified and an increase in rewards for prosocial involvement among youth. Central Utah Counseling also expects to see a decrease in lifetime alcohol use among adolescents, e-cigarette use among youth.

Community: Gunnison

Gunnison is identified as a G and a high priority. This coalition is all of the towns in Sanpete County that feed into Gunnison Valley High School. These communities are Gunnison, Centerfield, Mayfield, and Fayette. Central Utah Counseling Center and the Gunnison Cares Coalition have completed the Community Assessment and identified the following risk and protective factors to be addressed: Low neighborhood attachment, family management, low commitment to the school. The coalition also identified rewards for prosocial behavior as a protective factor to increase. The coalition has completed the area plan and has implemented the plan. The Gunnison Cares coalition is working on the evaluation of that plan to ensure that the programs implemented are having the desired effect in the community. Gunnison Cares Coalition is working to improve readiness by working with local leaders to increase awareness among adults of the dangers posed by e-cigarettes to youth. E-cigarette use among adolescents is higher in Gunnison Valley than in Sevier County and surrounding counties.

Central Utah Counseling Center will work with the Gunnison Cares Coalition to increase readiness by working with key leaders to raise awareness of prevention efforts and increase reach to more areas in the community. This effort will increase awareness of programs in the area and the importance of prevention efforts in the Gunnison Valley Area. Central Utah Counseling will continue to offer evidence-based programs to the community taught to fidelity. The North Sanpete Cares Coalition has collaborated with the South Sanpete School District to provide evidence-based programming on school grounds. This collaboration also helps the North Sanpete Cares Coalition increase the school district's capacity by providing training on evidence-based prevention practices and policy. Central Utah Counseling will continue to work with local authorities to increase EASY compliance checks. Central Utah Counseling will continue to increase capacity by training members of the Gunnison Cares Coalition in prevention science and cultural competency. The Counseling Center will also evaluate programming to ensure that programs are taught to fidelity and ensure that programming effectively reduces the risk factors and increases protective factors.

By adhering to these guidelines, Central Utah Counseling expects to see a reduction in the risks previously identified and an increase in rewards for prosocial involvement among youth. Central Utah Counseling also expects to see a decrease in e-cigarette use among youth, marijuana use, and opioid overdose deaths.

Community: East Millard

East Millard is identified at Readiness G and a high priority, this coalition is all of the towns in East Millard that feed into Millard High School. These communities are Kanosh, Holden, Scipio, Meadow, Hatton, and Flowell. Central Utah Counseling Center and the Coalition have completed the Community Data Assessment and identified the following risk and protective factors to be addressed: Parental attitudes favorable towards problem behavior, Low commitment to school, and attitudes favorable to drug use. The coalition also identified rewards for prosocial behavior as a protective factor to increase. The coalition has completed a data assessment and has completed the area plan. The East Millard Prevention coalition is working on the implementation stage.

Central Utah Counseling Center will work with the East Millard Prevention Coalition to increase readiness by working with key leaders to raise awareness of prevention efforts and increase reach to more areas in the community. This effort will increase awareness of programs in the area and the importance of prevention efforts in the East Millard Area. Central Utah Counseling will continue to offer evidence-based programs to the community taught to fidelity. The East Millard Prevention Coalition has collaborated with the Millard School District to provide evidence-based programming on school grounds. This collaboration also helps the East Millard Prevention Coalition increase the school district's capacity by providing training on evidence-based prevention practices and policy. Central Utah Counseling will continue to work with local authorities to increase EASY compliance checks. Central Utah Counseling will continue to increase capacity by training members of the East Millard Prevention Coalition in prevention science and cultural competency. The Counseling Center will also evaluate programming to ensure that programs are taught to fidelity and ensure that programming effectively reduces the risk factors and increases the protective factors for the area.

By adhering to these guidelines, Central Utah Counseling expects to see a reduction in the risks previously identified and an increase in rewards for prosocial involvement among youth. Central Utah Counseling also expects to see a decrease in lifetime alcohol use among adolescents, e-cigarette use among youth, marijuana use, and opioid overdose deaths.

Community: Juab

Because Juab is identified at ReadinessD-7 and a medium Priority, Central Utah Counseling will increase data collection needed to make this community a High priority. This coalition is all of the towns in Juab County that feed into Juab, Tintic, and Callao High Schools. These communities are Rocky Ridge, Mona, Levan, Nephi, Tintic, Callao, and Trout Creek. Central Utah Counseling Center and the coalition have completed the Community Data Assessment and identified the following risk and protective factors to be addressed: Perceived availability of drugs, low commitment to school, family conflict, and depressive symptoms. The coalition will be focused on generating a School District-based SHARPS Survey rather than a community one. They will also be working on a Community Assessment Report.

Central Utah Counseling Center will work with the Juab School District to have the SHARP survey given at the school and not at a community level. Bringing the SHARP survey to Juab at a school rather than at a community level in Central Utah will help the JUMP coalition with the data needed to move the coalition along through the phases of CTC. The coalition is

having difficulty gathering enough data to form a complete community assessment without the SHARPS. Due to lack of data for youth, the coalition focuses on Opioid use and has chosen the risk and protective factors to focus on based on the Community level SHARPS. The drawback to the Community level data is that it does not have as random sampling as you would get in the school. Central Utah hopes to get the survey done on a school level for the 2023 Survey and then move Juab to a high priority.

By adhering to these guidelines, Central Utah Counseling expects to see a reduction in the risks previously identified and an increase in rewards for prosocial involvement among youth. Central Utah Counseling also expects to see a decrease in opioid overdose deaths.

Community: Delta

Because Delta is identified as F and a high Priority, this coalition is all of West Millard County that feeds into Delta High School. These communities are Hinkley, Sutherland, Oak City, Lynndyl, Leamington, Delta, and Abraham. Central Utah Counseling Center and the coalition have completed the Community Assessment and identified the following risk and protective factors to be addressed: Parental attitudes favorable towards problem behavior, Low commitment to school, and attitudes favorable to drug use. The coalition also has identified rewards for prosocial behaviors as a protective factor to increase. The coalition has completed a Community Data Assessment and area plan. The coalition is working on the implementation and evaluation of approved programming in the area.

Central Utah Counseling Center will work with the Delta First Coalition to increase readiness by working with key leaders to raise awareness of prevention efforts and increase reach to more areas in the community. This effort will increase awareness of programs in the area and the importance of prevention efforts in the Delta Area. Central Utah Counseling will continue to offer evidence-based programs to the community taught to fidelity. The Delta First Coalition has collaborated with the Millard School District to provide evidence-based programming on school grounds. This collaboration also helps the Delta First Coalition increase the school district's capacity by providing training on evidence-based prevention practices and policy and the after school program. Central Utah Counseling will continue to work with local authorities to increase EASY compliance checks. Central Utah Counseling will continue to increase capacity by training members of the North Delta First Coalition in prevention science and cultural competency. The Counseling Center will also evaluate programming to ensure that programs are taught to fidelity and ensure that programming effectively reduces the risk factors and increases protective factors.

By adhering to these guidelines, Central Utah Counseling expects to see a reduction in the risks previously identified and an increase in rewards for prosocial involvement among youth. Central Utah Counseling also expects to see a decrease in lifetime alcohol use among adolescents, e-cigarette use among youth, marijuana use.

Community: Wayne

We do not currently have enough staff members to cover this area well. Central Utah does offer Wayne County the programming provided in Sevier. There is no central meeting place in the County where programming can be available to all residents without considerable

travel by up to an hour or more. This issue has posed a challenge in the past with offering services to this area. We are currently trying to locate grant funding to see if we can hire a staff member who resides in Wayne county to start a coalition to address substance use in Wayne County that may also reduce the issues mentioned above. We feel that it is essential to hire someone who resides in that community that knows and understands the divides and relationships to serve the community better. The new hire in Wayne county can begin to build trust with key leaders in the community, who can then create a community board to form a CTC coalition in the area. When This happens, Wayne will move to a medium Priority community until the coalition can become established and complete a community assessment.

Community: Piute

We do not currently have enough staff members to cover this area well Central Utah does offer Piute County the programming provided in Sevier. Piute also has a travel issue: the small towns are not close together, and the community does not attend services. Travel between communities may even exceed an hour when trying to find a gathering place for services. We are currently trying to locate grant funding to see if we can hire a staff member that resides in Piute county to start a coalition to address substance use in Piute County. We feel that it is crucial to hire someone who lives in that community that knows and understands the divides and relationships to serve the community better. The new hire in Piute county can begin to build trust with key leaders in the community, who can then create a community board to form a CTC coalition in the area. When This happens, Piute will move to a medium Priority community until the coalition can become established and complete a community assessment.

Community: Sevier

Sevier is identified as an F and a Med Priority. This coalition is all of the towns in Sevier County and feeds into three schools, North Sevier, Richfield, and Monroe. These communities are Redmond, Salina, Aurora, Sigurd, Venice, Glenwood, Richfield, Elsinore, Central, Annabella, Austin, Monroe, Joseph, and Sevier. Central Utah Counseling Center and the Coalition have completed the Community Assessment and identified the following risk and protective factors to be addressed: law and norms favorable to drug use, low-income family management, and parent attitudes favorable to antisocial behavior. The coalition also identified rewards for prosocial behaviors as a protective factor to increase. The coalition is working on an area plan. Central Utah Prevention Coalition is working to improve readiness by working with local cities to advance prevention. This area is a challenge because they are a community that wants to see change, but it's hard to convince them they need to put forth the effort and be united to make the change happen.

Central Utah Counseling Center will work with the Central Utah PreventionCoalition to increase readiness by working with key leaders to raise awareness of prevention efforts and increase reach to more areas in the community. This effort will increase awareness of programs in the area and the importance of prevention efforts in the south Sevier County Area. Central Utah Counseling will continue to offer evidence-based programs to the community taught to fidelity. The Central Utah Prevention Coalition has collaborated with the Sevier School District to provide evidence-based programming on school grounds. This collaboration also helps the

Central Utah Prevention Coalition increase the school district's capacity by providing training on evidence-based prevention practices and policy. Central Utah Counseling will continue to work with local authorities to increase EASY compliance checks.
