A primary goal for this county is to establish and build the coalition in Milford, effectively splitting the Beaver County coalition into two: Beaver and Milford. By the end of 2023, our goal is to have the Milford coalition established, with a key leader board and community board trained and functioning. The coalition will compile results for community readiness assessments and develop a strategic action plan. The coalition will move through Phase 1 and 2 of the CTC model and being implementing strategies/activities. The Beaver Coalition will conduct an evaluation of their implementation of CTC, and increase phase completion by 20 percentage points.

Problem: E-Cigarette Use among 6-12th graders									
Goal:		Reduce 9-12th e-cigarette use by 4%, by 2027							
Measures & Sources		Rates of e-cigarette use (lifetime and 30-day) increased almost every year since 2016 among all grades 6-12, but a steady increase (although not as drastic) in the rates of cigarette use (lifetime and 30-day) is occurring as well. Among the most concerning increases are: rates of 30-day e-cigarette use among 8th graders more than quadrupled (2.7% to 13.2%) and among 10th graders more than tripled (9.2% to 29.0%) from 2015 to 2019. Rates of 30-day cigarette use have almost doubled among all high schoolers (9th-12th graders) from 2015 to 2019 (3.8% to 7.2%) (SHARPs). The rates of juvenile citations (youth under age 18) for using a vaping mechanism to ingest tobacco and other products have increased steadily since 2017. In 2017, only four youth were cited; in 2018, 11 youth were cited; in 2019, 17 youth; and in 2020 there have already been eight youth cited (Juvenile Court Data).
