**American Fork CTC**

American Fork continues with their CTC and the coordinator has been in the role just over one year. There have been some struggles with the coordinator deciding to do some things on her own without the support of the County or the coalition. After discussion, this issue is being resolved and the community board is being shaped and groomed to step up to the plate for American Fork.

**Eagle Mountain/Saratoga Springs CTC**

This coalition is progressing well. They have a strong action plan and have great support from the school district and their community.

**Lehi Cares CTC**

Lehi hired the coordinator a few months ago and they have moved through the KLO and CBO and are moving to assessment phase.

**Lindon Cares CTC**

Lindon is Utah County's newest coalition. The KLO and CBO has been completed and the coordinator is moving forward with enthusiasm and passion. Great community support.

**Orem**

We met with Orem administration to present the idea of CTC in Orem, and they were very open. We will present to the Mayor and city council on May 23rd to obtain approval to partner.

**Pleasant Grove Cares**

PG sets the bar for the rest of the coalitions each year. The coordinator has announced that her assistant will be assuming the lead coordinator role and that she will be stepping down over the summer so a new assistant will be hired to replace Nicole.

**Payson/Goshen/Santaquin/Genola- CAASA**

Payson continues to provide events in their area and meet regularly as a board.

**Provo**

Provo is no longer housing a CTC coalition as of the end of FY22. We will readdress the need for a coalition in Provo, but a champion must be identified.

**Spanish Fork**

SF continues to support their coalition, but they are not using an EB framework. The city administrators don't feel they have a need to support a coalition financially.

**Springville**

Springville once partnered with Utah County but have not for several years. They run a coalition but it is not EB. We encourage partnership and provide resources as requested.

**Vineyard Cares**

Vineyard coordinator has moved the board through the CBO and KLO and they are providing great activities in their area! Lots of support from administration!

Utah County will also continue to increase capacity to provide prevention services through building coalitions in each area of the county. Our goal is to have an evidence-based coalition in every city. We have a goal to increase CTC's in the county by three in as many years.
