**Area Narrative:** Over the next three years, what will the LSAA do to support/enhance community driven evidence-based prevention? What are goals or expected outcomes for the LSAA and how will they be reached?

Weber Human Services is currently going through the comprehensive Strategic Prevention Framework. The LSAA is completing the assessment - Resource Assessment, gaps and Needs Assessment, and a community readiness assessment. WHS Px, in collaboration with community partners, has identified the following areas for coalition efforts: Ben Lomond Cone, Bonneville Cone, Morgan County, OgdenCAN/Ogden Cone, Project Success, and Weber State University. WHS Px also has identified specific strategies, through an assessment, to support coalition efforts. These strategies include Guiding Good Choices, Gus & Gussie, National Take Back Events, Gray Matters, Parents Empowered, Know Your Script, EASY compliance checks, Synar Compliance checks, Love and Logic, Botvin Lifeskills, and Second Step. WHS Px has been trained in additional research based strategies that impact mental health outcomes, but with separate funding. Over the next three years, WHS Px aims to increase the number of existing coalitions by three: Ben Lomond, Weber State University, and Morgan County.

**WHS Px Outcome:** Increase the number of existing coalitions within the LSAA by three. Proposed coalitions:

- Ben Lomond High School Cone
- Weber State University

- Weber State University
- Morgan County

**Ben Lomond strategies**(Theory of Change): Using the Know Your Script campaign, WHS will engage with key leaders through press events. From this activity, the key leaders will assist with developing a core workgroup. That core workgroup would then help to recruit and engage community members for the Community Board group.

**Ben Lomond first year goal:** Have at least one coalition training – Key Leader or Community Board orientation. Core workgroup will exist.

**Weber State University strategies (theory of change):** WHS will collaborate with WSU on the National Take Back Events (October 2023/April 2024). Additionally, WHS will connect WSU staff with University of Utah or other higher eds that have successfully managed a university level coalition. From this, WSU and WHS will coordinate with other campus entities to develop a core workgroup.

**WSU first year goal:** Provide one Take Back Event. WSU staff will meet with WHS and another higher ed at least once this fiscal year. Strategic action plan for next steps will be drafted with WSU.

**Morgan County strategies (theory of change):** WHS will collaborate with Morgan County efforts. WHS staff will sit on the Safety Council group with the Morgan School District. They have developed an action plan and have accomplished most of their goals set. The next step will be to develop a longer, more sustainable strategic plan. One of the priorities is to ensure that SHARP data is collected. Another priority is to ensure an evidence based prevention strategy is selected and implemented.

**Morgan County first year goal(s):** SHARP Data collected and reported by September 2023. Develop a three year strategic plan by June 30, 2024.

**Bonneville Communities that Care:** Because Bonneville is identified as a Medium Priority area, Weber Human Services will continue to provide CTC Coaching to coordinator as needed, in order to support the process, provide a prevention staff person on boards and/or workgroups, a representative on the KLB, as well as provide EBPs (both virtually and in-person where available). One aspect of coaching will be on developing a sustainable strategic plan. With the new logic models, all coalitions will need to be trained and coached on incorporating them into their strategic plans. WHS will partner with the coalition in collaborating with local schools and community partners to secure locations for EBPs, as well as support promotional efforts to recruit participants and engage in various environmental strategies/capacity building activities, such as Social Development Strategy trainings and activities, Statewide & localized prevention messaging campaigns including (but not limited to) Parents Empowered, Know Your Script, Live On Utah, Gray Matters Utah, Community Education on SUD related subjects, National Take Back Days, supporting EASY. The CTC Coach will provide TA and support as needed, and will evaluate progress in Milestones & Benchmarks quarterly. WHS will also support BCTC throughout the CADCA process in support of their DFC grant requirements, including their ongoing environmental strategies such as Opioid & Alcohol messaging throughout the community. As BCTC reassesses their Risk & Protective Factors based upon the most recent SHARP data, WHS will provide training and workshops as needed.

**Fremont 5 Communities that Care:** Because Fremont is identified as a High Priority area, Weber Human Services will continue to provide CTC Coaching to coordinator in order to support the process, provide a prevention staff person on the CB as a Px representative, a KLB representative, partner with the F5CTC to complete a community readiness survey, as well as provide EBPs (both virtually and in-person where available). One aspect of coaching will be on developing a sustainable strategic plan. With the new logic models, all coalitions will need to be trained and coached on incorporating them into their strategic plans. WHS will partner with the coalition in collaborating with local schools and community partners to secure locations for EBPs, as well as support promotional efforts to recruit participants and engage in various environmental strategies/capacity building activities, such as Social Development Strategy trainings and activities, Statewide & localized prevention messaging campaigns including (but not limited to) Parents Empowered, Know Your Script, Gray Matters Utah, National Take Back Days, supporting EASY & Synar Checks, Everyday Strong presentations and resource booklet distribution. Fremont has hired a new coordinator. This new coordinator will require intense CTC Coaching. The coalition is in the process of revising their action plan. They anticipate that a new strategic plan will be made available and implemented Fall 2023 (FY2024).

**Roy Communities that Care:** Roy CTC has been identified as high priority. Roy CTC is a DFC Grantee. The coordinator has requested additional CTC Coaching. WHS Coordinator and Regional Director will co-coach with the Roy CTC coordinator. Roy CTC is working on a new strategic action plan. One aspect of coaching will be on developing a sustainable strategic plan. With the new logic models, all coalitions will need to be trained and coached on incorporating them into their strategic plans. At a minimum, one staff of WHS Px will sit on the Community Board as a representative. WHS will partner with the coalition in collaborating with local schools and community partners to secure locations for EBPs, as well as support promotional efforts to recruit participants and engage in various environmental strategies/capacity building activities, such as Social Development Strategy trainings and activities, Statewide & localized prevention messaging campaigns including (but not limited to) Parents Empowered, Know Your Script, Gray Matters, National Take Back Days, and supporting EASY & Synar Checks.

Roy CTC is aiming to increase participation on their youth workgroup and increase advocacy efforts.

**Weber Communities that Care:** Weber CTC is a high priority. They are a DFC Grantee as well. With this grant and high priority, WHS Px will support WCTC by having a staff on the Community Board and one staff on the Key Leader Board. CTC Coaching will be provided to WCTC, including coaching on developing a sustainable strategic plan and incorporating the new logic model. WHS will partner with the coalition in collaborating with local schools and community partners to secure locations for EBPs, as well as support promotional efforts to recruit participants and engage in various environmental strategies/capacity building activities, such as Social Development Strategy trainings and activities, Statewide & localized prevention messaging campaigns including (but not limited to) Parents Empowered, Know Your Script, Gray Matters Utah, National Take Back Days, supporting EASY & Synar Checks, Everyday Strong presentations and resource booklet distribution. Additionally, WCTC is looking to increase their advocacy efforts throughout the year.

**Ogden Cone/OgdenCAN:** OgdenCAN covers a specific area within the Ogden High Cone. This group has key partners with United Way of Northern Utah, Boys & Girls Club, Weber Morgan Health Department, Weber State University and Ogden School District. The focus of OgdenCAN is to improve literacy rates among students within the specific area. With this focus, WHS Px will support OgdenCAN through the prioritized risk factors Academic Failure and Low Commitment to School. The group uses the Collective Impact model of coalition building. This evidence-based model is based upon the CTC model and has been peer reviewed.

**GYC Youth Coalition:** This youth coalition is housed in the WMHD and we have identified it as a medium priority.

**Project Success:** Project Success is a medium priority based upon capacity and readiness. Project Success has been in Ogden for almost 40 years, with a focus on serving the African American community within Weber/Davis counties. They focus on tobacco and health disparities. Project Success has proposed moving toward using the Communities that Care model. With this, WHS Px will work with and coach the new Project Success Coordinator through the CTC process.

As shown in Exhibit 10, nearly all organizers (98.6 percent) perceived that attendees who attended a THM increased their awareness of the negative impact of underage use of alcohol in their communities. Similarly, 96 percent of organizers perceived that attendees will become more involved in working on decreasing UAD in their communities (see Exhibit 11). CBOs indicated that parents plan to develop more alcohol-free activities for themselves and their children, talk with their teenagers about UAD, and spend more one-on-one time with their teens. Parents also plan to become more knowledgeable about their children's social activities and friends, reduce access to alcohol to youth and their friends, and start a parent network or support group. Moreover, CBOs also indicated that communities plan to become more involved in reducing UAD by joining a coalition (existing or new), creating more alcohol-free alternative activities for teens, and volunteering with youth activities. This perception is validated by activities that have already occurred in many communities after a THM.

Town Hall Meetings as a Strategic Solution:





THMs, which bring diverse community stakeholders together to confront the issue of UAD, are a strategic response to these recommendations. Some States also are making THMs part of their overall strategic approach to UAD prevention. For example, the Alaska Interagency Coordinating Committee on the Prevention of Underage Drinking incorporated THMs as one tool in the State strategy to prevent and reduce UAD on the basis of evidence that “the Town Hall Meeting process is invaluable in terms of gathering information and feedback on reducing and preventing underage drinking.”<sup>8</sup> Iowa uses THMs as part of its ongoing prevention planning for the State. After numerous and coordinated THMs are held across the State, a final THM provides a statewide summary of issues and recommendations developed at each of the other community THMs. These recommendations are submitted to the State for its consideration in revising its State plan to prevent UAD.

THMs represent an important step in responding both to The Surgeon General’s Call to Action To Prevent and Reduce Underage Drinking and to the first SAMHSA Strategic Initiative to: “Create communities where individuals, families, schools, faith-based organizations, and workplaces take action to promote emotional health and reduce the likelihood of mental illness, substance abuse including tobacco, and suicide.”<sup>9</sup>

Town Hall Meetings as a Strategic Solution:

THMs as a Strategic Solution In 2007, Acting U.S. Surgeon General Kenneth P. Moritsugu, M.D., M.P.H., called upon all communities to confront UAD as "a widespread and persistent public health and safety problem that creates serious personal, social, and economic consequences for adolescents, their families, communities, and the Nation as a whole."<sup>7</sup> Among recommended actions are that communities should: 1. Promote the idea that underage alcohol use is a local problem that local citizens can solve through concerted and dedicated action; Establish organizations and coalitions committed to establishing a local culture that disapproves of underage alcohol use, that works diligently to prevent and reduce it, and that is dedicated to informing the public about the extent and consequences of UAD; and Work to ensure that members of the community are aware of the latest research on adolescent alcohol use and, in particular, the adverse consequences of alcohol use on underage drinkers and other members of the community who suffer from its secondhand effects.
