As shown in Exhibit 10, nearly all organizers (98, 6 percent) perceived that attendees who attended a THM increased their awareness of the negative impact of underage use of alcohol in their communities. Similarly, 96 percent of organizers perceived that attendees will become more involved in working on decreasing UAD in their communities (see Exhibit 11). GBOs indicated that parents plan to develop more alcohol-free activities for themselves and their thidren, talk with their teenagers about UAD, and spend more on-on-ent time thickner, halk with their teenagers about to a support group.
